
THE VALE OF GLAMORGAN ...

Statistics don't tell the full story of child poverty in Wales but they help us to understand the challenge and keep us on track. A child in poverty has limited opportunities, leading to life long consequences.

This snapshot of The Vale of Glamorgan looks at poverty, place, people, work and education.



POVERTY AND PEOPLE

37,100 children and young people 0 -25 years old live in The Vale of Glamorgan **27,669** of them are 0-19 years olds.



16% of 0-19 year olds live in relative income poverty in The Vale of Glamorgan

14% of children and young people in The Vale of Glamorgan are living in severe poverty


Unemployment and low pay are key to child poverty. We therefore need to look at some of the economic factors of jobs and wages in The Vale of Glamorgan.



29% of working age people are economically inactive, 27% is the National Average.



7.6% of working age people are unemployed in The Vale of Glamorgan

---- National Average-£10.05


In 2011 the national living wage was £7.20 per hour. In The Vale of Glamorgan. 17.1% of workers earned £7.20 per hour or less.

POVERTY AND EDUCATION

Free School Meal (FSM) eligibility is a good way to estimate household income. At all key stages pupils who can have free school meals tend to perform less well than those who don't.

Young People Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET)

Out of the 3525 year 11 to 13 school leavers in The Vale of Glamorgan, 161 (4.57%) of them are known not to have continued in education, find a job or start a training course. The total number of 2011 school leavers NEET in Wales is 2838, a national average of 4.34%.



But, 14% of these children and young people who are allowed to have free school meals don't get them.

All schools receive £450 of Pupil Deprivation Grant per child who can have FSM. The Vale of Glamorgan gets £1,029,600 which is 3.17% of the total for Wales
