Note from the Chair

These are worrying times for schools in Wales. Welsh Government has not allocated enough money to fund the effects of the rise in the cost of living and the increases in staff salaries.

Many schools have set deficit budgets for 2023-24 financial year. In the Vale, we estimate almost half the schools will be in that situation. More, perhaps most schools in Wales will be posting deficit budgets for 2024-25. The impacts on children in Welsh Schools are grave:

- Reduction in the quality of learning & teaching
- Fewer teachers – either through non-replacement or redundancies. Insufficient support staff, meaning that children with Additional Learning Needs are at risk of not receiving the help they need.
- Fewer adults in classrooms, at lunchtime and breaks, putting everyone at risk.
- Less maintenance on buildings leading to safety concerns
- Increased stress on Headteachers and Senior staff, leading to greater sickness absence and burn-out.

And at the same time schools are struggling to implement educational reforms.

The Vale Governors Association is working on two fronts:

1. In conjunction with other Local Authority Governor Associations throughout Wales we have launched a Senedd petition with aim of triggering a Senedd debate on school funding. Please sign up and encourage the parents/ guardians at your school to do the same. We need 10,000 signatures at <https://petitions.senedd.wales/petition/245492>

2. The Vale of Glamorgan has been penalised by the Welsh Government funding formula for Education for more than twenty years. Currently each Vale pupil is worth £728 per annum less than the Welsh average – more than 10%. This is despite the Vale Council allocating more to Education than the formula suggests. VSGA is taking legal advice as to whether a judicial review is possible. Thank you to all the Governing Bodies who contributed financially towards this campaign.

I will keep Governors posted about how things progress.



Learn Welsh Levels

Intermediate: This level is for those who are familiar with the key language patterns of Welsh. You'll enjoy developing your speaking, writing, reading, and listening skills and you will enhance your vocabulary significantly.

Advanced: Here the focus is on developing your spoken Welsh. You'll also get to improve your reading, writing, and listening skills, and learn more about Wales.

Proficient: This level is for fluent learners and Welsh speakers who wish to build confidence to use and enjoy their language skills. The course is tailored to meet the particular needs of each class.

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Co-ordinated Admission Arrangements 2023

The Vale of Glamorgan Council has operated co-ordinated admission arrangements for the Primary School Admissions process since a pilot scheme was initiated for the 2019-20 reception intake.

The governing bodies of Llansannor C.W Primary, St Andrew's Major C.W Primary, St Brides Major C.W Primary, St David's C.W Primary, St Joseph's R.C Primary and Wick & Marcross C.W Primary and for the 2023-24 intake, All Saints C.W Primary have agreed to become part of the co-ordinated arrangements and it is hoped that the remaining schools not currently involved, will recognise the benefits and look to join in the future which will provide greater transparency to all involved.

The 2021-22 Secondary School Admissions process also saw the governing body of St Richard Gwyn Catholic High School become part of the co-ordinated admission arrangements.

The co-ordinated arrangements do not in any way impact on the application of individual schools or council admissions policies. It is purely an administrative exercise that has helped us to understand the benefits of coordinated admissions, particularly as a way of supporting families to secure their first preference for a school place and avoiding the distress caused to parents by delayed offers and unnecessary appeals.

By working collaboratively on the coordinated school admissions, this has resulted in a greater number of pupils securing a place in the first round of allocations and reduced the number of families that would previously have had to wait some considerable time for an offer of a place or an appeal hearing. It is hoped that in future years we will see the remaining faith schools within the Vale of Glamorgan join the co-ordinated arrangements in order to provide enhanced transparency for parents and pupils and also increased planning and organisation for both schools and the local authority.

The impact of poverty on learners from lower income families is well documented and affects wellbeing and attainment. The associated costs of the school day can exacerbate this and practical day to day school life can become problematic.

Our successful Price of Pupil Poverty Guides, designed for schools and addressing five key areas (**Understanding Poverty; School Uniform and Clothing; Food and Hunger; Participation in the life of the School; Home-School Relationship**) have been developed into a new School Governors' Guide.

Written specifically for Governors, this guide provides an insight into each of the five key areas of the Guides from a Governor perspective and also looks at school policies, Welsh Government funding and projects to tackle poverty in schools.

Supporting the Period Dignity Initiative!

The Vale of Glamorgan has been playing a key role in delivering the Welsh Government's Period Dignity initiative ensuring all learners in the county have access to free period products. At its core the initiative seeks to challenge the stigmas and taboos around periods. By encouraging more conversations, pupils will better understand periods, what is normal and where to seek help. Pupils can request free period products, which are delivered to them in a practical and dignified way. Whilst the scheme is open to all, there has been particular focus on promoting it to lower income households and vulnerable students.

The Welsh Government requires that a minimum of 80% of funding is spent on eco-friendly products, and as such, there has been an emphasis on promoting reusable products where possible. We currently stock :-

- Reusable pads
- Reusable pants
- Menstrual cups
- Pantyliners
- Pads – Medium/Super
- Non Applicator Tampons – Regular/Super
- Applicator Tampons – Regular/Super

We have nurtured good relationships with the following companies who all have eco friendly credentials or small carbon footprints:-

We have employed a teacher to undertake sessions within all Schools, focusing on Primary Schools in the first instance, which highlight to pupils everything surrounding periods, cycles, use of products etc. Since January 2023 we have undertaken sessions within 95% of the Primary Schools in the Vale. Each pupil who attends these sessions will be given a free bag of products to take home.

The Vale of Glamorgan PPE team have been helping to administer the initiative by making up and delivering product bags to all of the Schools who have undergone sessions as well as the majority of Secondary Schools who have requested bags for year groups – with one school requesting 1000 bags! We have also supplied Atlantic College

Pick & Mix Dispensers

We are also trialling 'Pick & Mix' Sanitary Dispenser which will allow members of the public to take sanitary items when they need them without having to ask specifically for them.

We currently have 3 units based within the Reception area of the Civic Offices in Barry, Golau Caredig (on Broad Street) and in Pencoedtre High School. The feedback so far from these units has been very positive and highlights the need for products. If these are successful then we will look to roll these dispensers out to further settings in the future.

Using our in-house expertise, or securing specialist contractors, we can take the worry out of your building compliance responsibilities in schools and other public buildings.

The Corporate Compliance Team undertake initial site visits in respect of building compliance to establish your compliance needs, whether statutory or recommended.

Building maintenance and management forms a critical part of the day to day activity in all our schools and there is a clear responsibility on managers and senior members of staff to ensure building systems and installations are safe to use. Failure to complete the relevant compliance checks and inspections can have serious consequences and the HSE would look to prosecute and even imprison where the failings are significant. To support headteachers and governing bodies, the Council has a Corporate Compliance team in place to audit building compliance within schools. There are limitations on the activities this team can achieve, however they are available to offer guidance to schools in order to support you in meeting the responsibilities both headteachers and governors hold.

To assist in meeting your responsibilities as a governing body, it is recommended that you have a regular agenda item for your Premises Committee to review building compliance and check on the following:

The Corporate Compliance team keep a check on all certificates and notify your school when these are about to expire. They will also contact the Headteacher in relation to outstanding certification where it has not been received. It is relevant to note that where recommendations for work has been made to remedy defects at the time of the inspection, the Corporate Compliance team are unable to determine if this has been resolved or planned for remedy. You are therefore advised to satisfy yourself that the appropriate course of action is being taken and that sufficient budget is being made available to keep the school safe.

The checks covered by the Corporate Compliance Team does not cover some apparatus not forming part of the building such as, play equipment, trees, portable hoists, etc and you may also want to add these to your check list.
