WHAT IS SEXUAL HARASSMENT?

Sexual harassment is any kind of unwanted behaviour of a sexual nature that makes you feel humiliated or intimidated, or that creates a hostile, degrading or offensive environment. **Equality Act 2010**

Verbal Harassment

Verbal harassment might include someone making sexually suggestive comments to you, for example remarking on your body or appearance, or catcalling.

Sexual Jokes

If you're subjected to sexual jokes that make you feel uncomfortable, offended or intimidated, this counts as sexual harassment.

Unwanted sexual advances are a form of sexual harassment. This might include 'leering' or unwanted and inappropriate sexual propositions, whether in person, over the phone or by email.

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REPORTING SEXUAL HARASSMENT... WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

When you have reported a crime, an officer will come out to speak to you and ask you to recall what happened so they can establish the circumstances before arranging to take a more formal account from you. This can be done in your home or other place of safety or at the police station. It will involve giving a detailed account of what happened and making sure that they get everything that is needed including whether you want to attend court. This is known as a statement. If you want a friend or family member to stay with you whilst you do this, then this shouldn't be a problem.

The police should stay in contact with you by your preferred method throughout the investigation. They will offer you support and may be able to signpost you to other agencies, if that is appropriate.

The police also work alongside highly trained non-police agencies who can assist with aftercare for you and your family.

If you need to attend court as part of the investigation there are special measures which can be put in place to make sure you don't feel overwhelmed or alienated by the legal process. There are also services which can support you throughout the process.
