This need is being reflected in the Council's Band B submission for the Welsh Government's 21st Century Schools Programme, which has the capacity to introduce substantial places linked to Welsh medium across all sectors, and to reflect new large-scale housing developments planned over the next 10 years.</p> <p>Specifically, the proposed programme includes the relocation and redevelopment of an existing Welsh primary school, providing much needed space as well as the opportunity for expansion of up an additional 105 pupils. Also included in the programme are two new primary schools, with a total capacity of 630 places. The Council will be considering the character of these schools as Welsh medium in line with the Welsh Governments Cymraeg 2050 Strategy, and within the context of the Welsh in Education Strategic Plan framework. A likely outcome from the initiatives above will be an increase in demand for supporting pupils at a later stage in their education transition from English medium education into Welsh medium education. Transitional arrangements will therefore need to be facilitated via the Council to support those learners. A number of options are available:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Vale pupils attend the Welsh Immersion Centre in Cardiff. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupils spend up to 12 weeks an immersion centre, Uned Trochi Glan Ceubal. They are registered with their Welsh medium school and attend the unit Monday to Friday lunchtime. They spend the Friday afternoon in the Welsh medium school to which they have transferred. This option is being explored in the 2017/18 academic year with a number of pupils from the Vale attending the Centre. The scheme offers groups free of charge to parents during the school term and offers baby massage, baby yoga, Welsh story and rhyme, and a Clwb Doti a Fi. In the Vale, groups are held at Bethel (Penarth), The Library in Barry and the United Free Church. A new contract awarded to Adult Community Learning (ACL) Welsh for Adults (WfA) for 2016-17 prioritises mainstream once-a-week provision. Intensive, twice- a-week courses (for 30 weeks a year) will be provided. A pilot one-day family course was run in the summer holidays 2016, and Taster courses for ESOL learners will be provided at the new Open Learning Centre at Barry Library.

Updates are regularly sent to Family Information Service (FIS) of post-16 and family learning Welsh medium and Learn Welsh.

families with children in Welsh-medium education. The successful pilot term April-July 2018 led to a new bid and a further grant award of £30,000 to extend the provision to the end of 2018-19 academic year. Clwb Ni flourished during 2018-2019 and a new bid made to the National Centre for Learning Welsh for Innovation Grant funding for 2019-2020. A much reduced grant of £10,000 has been awarded. The grant will not be available after this academic year. The Adult Learning Grant will provide bilingual learning for adults attending Clwb Ni which will add value to the grant. Urdd will continue to provide staff for activities in Clwb Ni, and during 2019-2020 will support this provision without charge. Unfortunately, Mudiad Meithrin has withdrawn support in September 2019 due to staff changes. A search for suitable nursery staff is being supported by Menter Bro Morgannwg and Debbie Maule. Children from every Welsh-medium school in the Vale have attended Clwb Ni in the past 12 months.

Welsh for Adults classes are provided in the county by Learn Welsh the Vale by contract with NCLW until July 31 2019. A new contract for 2019-2022 has been achieved. Take-up of fast-track learning has increased year-on-year, and enrolments on once a week 30- week courses have also risen substantially. The target of 20% over three years has been surpassed by an increase in numbers of 100% over two years.

Initial indications for academic year 2019-2020 show an increase in learner numbers on 2018-2019. Several small Work Welsh contracts have been won by Learn Welsh the Vale, to provide Welsh in workplaces in the Cardiff area.

The Get Back on Track programme of WG funded courses in 2019-2020 include digital learning through the medium of Welsh. A monthly Welsh Book Club is held at Palmerston Centre, supported by the Libraries Service. One weekly Digital workshop is provided through the medium of Welsh and advertised as such.

Learn Welsh the Vale has developed its social media profile through regular use of FB and Twitter, and its posts are retweeted and shared by Cyngor Bro Morgannwg, Family Information Service, Menter Bro Morgannwg, Urdd, Mudiad Meithrin, Cymrodorion y Barri and all Welsh- medium primary schools. Likewise LWTW supports these partner organisations through social media. In the last 90 days 2306 people have been reached by the FB page with 62 post engagements and 46 link clicks.
