The plan must be published no later than 12 months after the local government elections on the 4th May 2017.

# **SPSF 3: Collective role**

## **(public services boards)**

### Town and Community Councils

- Those councils covered by the Act will be required to take steps to meet the PSB objectives and will need to be involved in the development of the objectives and plan.
- its gross income or its gross expenditure was at least £200,000

# Community areas & Well Being Assessment

- The assessment must identify the geographic community areas which comprise the board's entire area.
- It is intended that these 'communities' are localities within the board's area which are large enough to show differences between them and have a sense of identity but not as small as electoral wards. .
- Whilst the board may consider aligning these community areas with existing community networks ... for the purpose of the assessment will not necessarily correspond with the community councils within the board's area.

# **SPSF 4: Collective role (Community councils)**

- Each community and town council subject to the duty must form its own judgement of what steps it would be reasonable for it to take towards meeting the local objectives in its area
- If a community or town council is subject to the duty, it must publish a report for each relevant financial year

# SPSF 4: Collective role (Community councils)

- Public services boards must consult all community and town councils in their areas on their local well-being plans
- .Community and town councils should consider the local well-being plan and review the local objectives alongside their own objectives for the year ahead.
- The duty in section 40(1) of the Act is to contribute to the achievement of the local objectives in the local well-being plan applying in the particular council's area, rather than directly to the well-being goals.
- PSB –Potential themes
- Early years and Intervention,
- Employability, prosperity and secure work,
- Empowerment, working with communities rather than doing things to them.
