

Update on 20mph **Default Speed** Limit Rollout in the Vale of Glamorgan

### Background

- The Welsh 20mph Task Force Group Final Report (July 2020) set out a case for introducing a default 20mph speed limit on **restricted roads**\* across Wales.
- All 21 recommendations of the TFG were accepted by WG
- The main rationale behind changing the default speed limit fewer road collisions, people feeling safer and benefit physical and mental well-being.
- 20mph will contribute to many other WG strategic priorities and well-being goals.

<sup>\*</sup>Restricted roads include street lights placed no more than 200 yards apart. They are usually located in residential and built-up areas with high pedestrian activity.

# 20mph Pilot Schemes

- January 2021: <u>8 First Phase settlements</u> selected (20mph Pilot Schemes)
- St Brides Major, Vale of Glamorgan
- First Phase has been used to test the processes and potential issues arising in advance of the National Rollout phase of the 20mph default speed limit on 17<sup>th</sup> September 2023

## National Rollout Programme

- November 2020: 20mph Public attitude survey
- July-October 2021: <u>Public Consultation to reduce default speed</u> limit to 20mph
- 12<sup>th</sup> July 2022: Vote on the main Statutory Instrument in the Senedd
- 17<sup>th</sup> March 2023: Welsh Government launched a public awareness campaign to inform the public on the new limits being introduced – signpost to websites and social media. <u>Introducing default 20mph speed limits & Safer at 20mph</u>
- Key messages 20mph will help save lives and protect our communities; 20mph will affect most 30mph roads, which are generally residential or busy pedestrian streets.
- Local Authorities have been issued with <u>Stakeholder</u> <u>Communications Toolkits</u>, <u>Feb 2023</u> to support the campaign.
- 17<sup>th</sup> September 2023: Coming into Force date for the 20mph default speed limit in Wales

## Legislative Programme

- Welsh Ministers have powers to amend primary legislation to introduce a national, default speed limit of 20mph on restricted roads, as defined in <u>Section 82 of the</u> <u>Road Traffic Regulation Act (RTRA) 1984.</u>
- Default speed limit includes 'Restricted' roads only, i.e. those with streetlights placed no more than 200 yards apart.
- Note: Roads that are currently 40mph (or above) are out of scope for the 20mph National Rollout Programme. Any changes required will be covered under the proposed revision of <u>Setting Local Speed Limits in</u> Wales Guidance

# Exceptions Criteria

- Highway authorities can set exceptions to 20mph speed limits on A & B Class restricted roads.
- WG Guidance: Setting exceptions to the 20mph default speed limit for restricted roads.
- Setting exceptions involves keeping the road at 30mph rather than it defaulting to 20mph in accordance with WG Legislation.

## Enforcement of 20mph

- Within the existing First Phase settlements both the Police and GoSafe have employed a number of enforcement and educational tactics that have been proportionate in response to the speed data.
- The police will continue to work in partnership working with LAs, road safety practioners and the public.
- Police will engage with LAs to identify and target highest risk roads for enforcement after 17th of September.
- Police will review the site adoption process to ensure enforcement of 20mph is appropriate and proportionate.
- Police to review staffing, equipment, and fleet capabilities to effectively respond to complaints and concerns in communities.
- Engagement and education in addition to enforcement through Fire and Rescue to continue at roadside.
- Promote Community Speed Watch empowering communities to engage with speeding motorists.

# Implications for the Vale

- The Guidance for the Exceptions ONLY apply to A and B classified (Main) roads. i.e. A48 B4524 etc.
- Exception mapping presented in November 2022 when numerous errors were identified.
- Vale worked with TfW to address errors and a new exception map produced.
- Further presentation provided in May 2023 with updated mapping.
- Exception map now published on <u>Data</u>
  <u>Map Wales</u>.

## Vale Implementation Programme

- Design of signs and road markings for new 20mph default speed limit complete.
- Work to change signs and road markings commenced and will continue beyond 17th September.
- Publication of TRO for Exception maps published on 22 June 2023 - 28 day public notice for objections / comments.
- Exception map now live on <u>Data Map Wales</u>.
- Full details of proposed TRO on the Vale's website where schedule and plans can be viewed.
- Any objections will be reported to Cabinet for consideration.
- If no objections received the TROs can be implemented without Cabinet report.

### Budget Position

- WG funding award last FY 2022/23 to value £237,331 fully committed – signs ordered, signposts installation and removal of road markings commenced.
- Award of WG grant for implementation of 20mph default speed limit in FY 2023/24up to £1.59M.
